The Word of God

OLD TESTAMENT READING Isaiah 11:1-10

A shoot shall come out from the stock of Jesse, and a branch shall grow out of his roots.

The spirit of the LORD shall rest on him, the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge and the fear of the LORD. His delight shall be in the fear of the LORD.

He shall not judge by what his eyes see, or decide by what his ears hear; but with righteousness he shall judge the poor, and decide with equity for the meek of the earth; he shall strike the earth with the rod of his mouth, and with the breath of his lips he shall kill the wicked. Righteousness shall be the belt around his waist, and faithfulness the belt around his loins.

The wolf shall live with the lamb,
the leopard shall lie down with the kid,
the calf and the lion and the fatling together,
and a little child shall lead them.
The cow and the bear shall graze,
their young shall lie down together;
and the lion shall eat straw like the ox.
The nursing child shall play over the hole of the asp,
and the weaned child shall put its hand on the adder's den.
They will not hurt or destroy
on all my holy mountain;
for the earth will be full of the knowledge of the LORD
as the waters cover the sea.

On that day the root of Jesse shall stand as a signal to the peoples; the nations shall inquire of him, and his dwelling shall be glorious.

Give the king your justice, O God, and your righteousness to a king's son.

May he judge your people with righteousness, and your poor with justice.

May the mountains yield prosperity for the people, and the hills, in righteousness.

May he defend the cause of the poor of the people, give deliverance to the needy, and crush the oppressor.

May he live while the sun endures, and as long as the moon, throughout all generations. May he be like rain that falls on the mown grass, like showers that water the earth.

In his days may righteousness flourish and peace abound, until the moon is no more.

Blessed be the LORD, the God of Israel, who alone does wondrous things.
Blessed be his glorious name for ever; may his glory fill the whole earth. Amen and Amen.

GOSPEL READING Matthew 3:1-12

In those days John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness of Judea, proclaiming, 'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near.' This is the one of whom the prophet Isaiah spoke when he said,

'The voice of one crying out in the wilderness:

"Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight." '

Now John wore clothing of camel's hair with a leather belt around his waist, and his food was locusts and wild honey. Then the people of Jerusalem and all Judea were going out to him, and all the region along the Jordan, and they were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins.

But when he saw many Pharisees and Sadducees coming for baptism, he said to them, 'You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the wrath to come? Bear fruit worthy of repentance. Do not presume to say to yourselves, "We have Abraham as our ancestor"; for I tell you, God is able from these stones to raise up children to Abraham. Even now the axe is

lying at the root of the trees; every tree therefore that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire.

'I baptize you with water for repentance, but one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to carry his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing-fork is in his hand, and he will clear his threshing-floor and will gather his wheat into the granary; but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire.'

AFFIRMATION OF FAITH We stand and turn to look in the direction of Church, to emphasise our gathering around a precious, shared story, as told in Philippians:

Though he was divine,
he did not cling to equality with God,
but made himself nothing.
Taking the form of a slave,
he was born in human likeness.
He humbled himself
and was obedient to death,
even the death of the cross.
Therefore God has raised him on high,
and given him the name above every other name:
that at the name of Jesus
every knee should bow.
and every voice proclaim that Jesus Christ is Lord,
to the glory of God the Father.
Amen.

FOR REFLECTION

Isaiah has pictured a tree stump: all that was left of Israel. There is no going back from cutting down a tree. The people of Israel were so depressed they wondered if God himself had chopped them down. Now, though, Isaiah imagines a new shoot growing out of that stump, a future that will be even more beautiful and peaceable than their nostalgic past.

Spend time thinking of no-going back moments where all seemed lost: it may be something personal to you, or it may be a disaster like an invasion, a political collapse, the destruction of an industry or business.

Hear how the Psalmsist expects a King's virtue to be measured by the way he applies the law for the well being of the poor. Bring to mind leaders you think functional and those you think dysfunctional.

We turn our reflection into PRAYERS:

Begin by imagining John's voice in the wilderness and the image of preparing a path for God. You could even, if able, take a brush and sweep the floor for a little while embodying the sweeping of the path to your heart where God will come to you in prayer.

Then, bring to God the circumstances and leaders that came to mind as you responded to Isaiah.

Ask him to bring new life where there seems little hope.

Then, praying for leaders, you might pray for the present Transport Secretary, the Health Secretary and the Home Secretary as they face seemingly intractable problems and whose decisions affect us all, especially the poorest among us.

Among those we know who may be waiting in illness, we pray for Martha Ann and Norman Brookes, for Lynn Busfield, and for all returning to work after illness or bereavement.
