SERMON in Church is from David

For those at home:

To set John 10 in context you might like to read Ezekiel Chapter 34. There the prophet condemns the religious leaders of Israel for being complacent, greedy, neglectful shepherds of God's people. For Jesus to choose the shepherd imagery, and marginalise those in power as "thieves and robbers", so bursting the bubble of their inflated self-worth, is to place himself firmly in Ezekiel's camp. Now he offers himself as a shepherd for any who trust his voice: the voice we have heard in all those conversations in John's gospel.

He then offers another metaphor: the gate of the sheepfold. He pictures the sheep coming and going through the gate. Indeed, as the Word made flesh, Jesus is the one in whom heaven and earth meet. His very being shows earthy humanity and heavenly divinity together. He is a kind of threshold between us.

Importantly, Jesus does not see enclosure in the fold as once and for all. He is excited by the comings and goings of the sheep, their nourishment in the world, confident in their safe anchorage in the Shepherd's fold and under his gaze.

He will develop the shepherd metaphor further after his resurrection, inviting Peter to be shepherd for the church asking him three times to "feed my sheep." The watchful, protective, nurturing role is shared. As ever, God works in partnership with his people.

By the time we reach the events in Acts, we find ourselves in the presence of people whose identity is not shaped according to the rules of the Roman empire, nor the rules of the Temple, although they do gladly go there to pray. The community that defines itself by relationship with Jesus is one of generosity, reflection, outward looking concern for the world. They are not playing by the rules of jealousy and fear. This is what attracts people to join them.

Further on in time, the letter of Peter gives us a glimpse of the church working out what its bearing should be, living in the reality of Empire. I suggest reading a bit more than the set verses. It's hard at first, but read 2:13 —end. In Acts 2 Peter had demonstrated in brave public preaching his independence from the powers that execute and persecute. In this letter written in his name, we might at first be surprised to hear him say "accept the authority of every human institution…emperor…governor…Honour everyone….Honour the emperor." Is this a move backwards?

No: it is the next step forwards and it is radically defiant. Having firmly established that our identity is in the risen Christ, we are living as "free people" – a bold claim in an occupied land – then he says, we choose to cooperate with the earthly powers. It's our initiative to honour everyone – yes, *even* the Emperor. He somewhat shockingly tells slaves to accept the authority of masters with "deference." This does not for ever underwrite the institution of slavery, but it dares to imagine what marks out the life of a Christian slave. "As slaves of God," he dares to quip, we are "free people." That freedom is not to be used against others, but to go towards and to mark our relationships with grace. Clearly members of the church are being persecuted, but he says in that circumstance, you can be sure Christ himself is as close as can be. He did not abuse his abusers and did not resort to threats. It's hard to read, but even when persecuted, Peter

argues, those who define themselves in relation to Jesus the good shepherd are free to pray for those who would harm them.

We affirm our faith

We stand and at home, if able, we turn to look in the direction of Church, to affirm our faith in God, revealed to us as Father, Son and Holy Spirit:

APOSTLES' CREED

All:

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth. I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died and was buried; he descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, he is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come to judge the living and the dead. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

INTERCESSIONS

At home: having dwelt on shepherding, good and bad, pray for all in positions of leadership: those exposed to criticism; those tempted to use power for themselves; those whose service moves and impresses us; those who make us angry. Remembering Ezekiel's and Jesus' anger about dysfunctional leadership, ask God to help us stay generous even in our anger.

We might pray for the King anticipating Coronation, asking what should mark our Christian witness in this regime and this era.

Pray for any caught up in modern day slavery, for their courage and protection. Ask God to give them all they need to hold on to their precious identity in Christ, and show them what defiant love looks like in their circumstance. Expose the injustice and brutality of those who commoditise people and reveal how imprisoned they really are.

If there is anyone you are particularly worried about at the moment, especially anyone who in some sense you feel is going astray, ask God to show what fullness of life might look like for them.

Among those who are unwell we pray for Dorothy and Norman Brookes.

Among those who have died we remember Iain Galloway, Pat Warbrick and John Vincent Felton.

THE PEACE

fullness." The peace of the Lord be always with you.

All: And also with you.

Let us offer one another a sign of peace.

The Table is prepared in Church. At home, now is the time to say the Lord's Prayer (below) and consume the food and drink you have prepared, first praying:

God, we long for Communion. With this symbolic meal stir my hope for the fellowship meal we cannot yet see, and help me wait for it with patience. **Amen**. (cf Romans 8:2)

We tell the story of salvation

Priest: The Lord is here.

All: God's Spirit is with us.

Lift up your hearts.

We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give thanks and praise.

Shepherding God, we praise and thank you because you gathered your flock around Abraham, and through Moses and Joshua you brought your sheep to a place of safety. In Jesus you came to us as a Passover Lamb to take away the sins of the world. As our everlasting good shepherd you promise that those who hear your voice shall never be in want, for you know your sheep by name and you call us your own and give to each of us a place in the sheepfold of your kingdom, where angels and archangels and all the company of heaven sing your unending praise.

We repeat after the cantor:

All: Holy, holy, holy Lord!

God of power and God of might.

Heav'n and earth are full of your glory.

Hosanna in the highest!

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord most high.

Sustaining God, as you lead your sheep to green pastures and guide them beside still waters, so you have led us to this table where in bread and wine you restore our soul. Send down your Holy Spirit and restore your church through the abundance of this sacred meal. As we remember the story of your Son's life laid down for us, sanctify this bread and cup and make them be for us the body and blood of your Son Jesus Christ. Who, at supper with his disciples, took bread, gave you thanks, broke the bread, and gave it to them, saying, "Take, eat: this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me."

A bell is rung

After supper he took the cup. Again he gave you thanks, and gave it to his disciples saying, "Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new

covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me."

Deacon: Great is the mystery of faith:

THE LORD'S PRAYER

Deacon: As our Saviour taught us, so we pray:

Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done,

on earth as in heaven.

Give us today our daily bread.

Forgive us our sins

as we forgive those who sin against us.

Lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil.

For the kingdom, the power,

and the glory are yours now and for ever. Amen.

Priest: We break this bread to share in the body of Christ.

All: Though we are many, we are one body.

For we all share in one bread.

Draw near with faith. Receive the body of our Lord Jesus Christ which he gave for you. Eat in remembrance that he died and now lives for you, and feed on him in your heart by faith with thanksgiving.

We sing: Jesus, Lamb of God, have mercy on us.

Jesus, bearer of our sins, have mercy on us.

Jesus, Redeemer of the world, give us your peace. (x2)

We pause to remember all who pray at home, then share the bread, now for us the body of Christ.
