CONFESSION

Priest God proves his love for us in that while we were sinners Christ died for us. Therefore with confidence let us confess our sins and seek his forgiveness. (Romans 5:8)

SERMON in Church by John Parkin

For reflection at home:

Paul in his writing to the Romans does not shy away from the realities of where he is at, the tension that exist between his nature as a Christian and the actions he does explaining how sometimes even when he wills what is right, he cannot do it.

While Paul does this writing to people that he might not even know, can we be honest with ourselves about our struggles with sin or choosing to do what is right within the privacy of our homes or with ourselves without giving excuses?

Paul however does not leave us in the doom and gloom of our struggles with the inconsistency of our wills and actions. He points us to Him through whom we can be delivered from sin, Jesus Christ who washes our sins away and we can go to him and openly confess and pray for forgiveness.

This Jesus who is our Lord, when we meet him in our gospel from Matthew 11 says, 'Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest.' So, we can with confidence take the things that burden us not just in the contradictions of our actions but in all aspects of our lives.

We can be burdened by other conflicts we are seeing in our world in the abuse of power and positions, the unfairness of our justice systems, those who need healing.... We can list for ourselves all the things we have on our minds and have them ready when we pray.

We affirm our faith

We stand and at home, if able, we turn to look in the direction of Church, to affirm our faith in God, revealed to us as Father, Son and Holy Spirit:

All: I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died and was buried; he descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, he is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come to judge the living and the dead. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holv catholic Church, the communion of saints, the foraiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

INTERCESSIONS

For those at home:

We think firstly of ourselves and the tension that we live with that might be similar to Pauls and we pray for God's forgiveness and grace, for Him to be our strength and ask for his will to be done.

Priest: We are the body of Christ. In the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body. Let us then pursue all that makes for peace and builds up our common life. The peace of the Lord be always with you and also with you.

All: And also with you. Let us offer one another a sign of peace.

 I cannot tell how he whom angels worship should stoop to love the peoples of the earth, or why as shepherd he should seek the wand'rer with his mysterious promise of new birth.
 But this I know, that he was born of Mary, when Bethl'em's manger was his only home, and that he lived at Nazareth and laboured, and so the Saviour, Saviour of the world, is come.

 I cannot tell how silently he suffered, as with his peace he graced this place of tears, or how his heart upon the cross was broken, the crown of pain to three and thirty years.
 But this I know, he heals the broken-hearted, and stays our sin, and calms our lurking fear, and lifts the burden from the heavy laden, for yet the Saviour, Saviour of the world, is here.

3. I cannot tell how he will win the nations, how he will claim his earthly heritage, how satisfy the needs and aspirations of east and west, of sinner and of sage.
But this I know, all flesh shall see his glory, and he shall reap the harvest he has sown, and some glad day his sun shall shine in splendour when he the Saviour, Saviour of the world, is known. 4. I cannot tell how all the lands shall worship, when, at his bidding, ev'ry storm is stilled, or who can say how great the jubilation when ev'ry heart with perfect love is filled. But this I know, the skies will thrill with rapture, and myriad, myriad human voices sing, and earth to heav'n and heav'n to earth, will answer: "At last the Saviour, Saviour of the world, is King!" We tell the story of salvation

Priest: The Lord be with you.

All:

And also with you. Lift up your hearts. We lift them to the Lord. Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give thanks and praise.

Father, Lord of heaven and earth, we gladly lift our hearts to you in thanksgiving and praise, because you have hidden your story of salvation from the wise and intelligent and revealed it to infants. You have disclosed your mercy to the outcast Hagar, to the barren Sarah, to the shunned Rahab, to the childless Hannah and to the unmarried Mary. In Jesus you became a child for us, through whom we might discover the secrets of your glory. Again and again you revealed your sacred purpose through those your world despises, demeans or ignores. Finally you made your purpose known through your Son, cursed by our sin as he hung on the cross. And so we rejoice with angels and archangels and with all the company of heaven, singing the song of your unending praise:

All: <u>Holy, holy, holy Lord,</u> God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest.

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

Overflowing God, as you led your children to meet their destinies at the well, you became in Christ the well of life that replenishes us that we may never be thirsty again. Fill your church with your abundant grace that it may be a cup that runneth over with your mercy. Send your Holy Spirit upon this food and drink that they may be for us the body and

blood of your Son Jesus Christ. Who, at supper with his disciples, took bread, gave you thanks, broke the bread, and gave it to them, saying, 'Take, eat: this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me.'

A bell is rung

After supper he took the cup. Again he gave you thanks, and gave it to his disciples, saying, 'Drink this, all of you: this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.'

Deacon: Great is the mystery of faith: All: Christ has died, Christ is risen, Christ will come again.

Deacon: As our Saviour taught us, so we pray: Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us. Lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil. For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours now and for ever. Amen.

Priest: We break this bread to share in the body of Christ.

All: Though we are many, we are one body. For we all share in one bread. Draw near with faith. Receive the body of our Lord Jesus Christ which he gave for you. Eat in remembrance that he died and now lives for you, and feed on him in your heart by faith with thanksgiving.


