At home, hear Paul's talk of caring tenderly and with gentleness, even as he writes to people he cannot physically see. You may, of necessity, feel less able to get out and about, having less direct contact with your neighbours. Think over the ways in which you do encounter people, especially strangers: a district nurse, someone on a telephone switchboard you're trying to get information from, delivery or postal workers; also consider the more removed but significant neighbourly connections, perhaps through a charity you support which may be working far away; think of those friends or family you hear from or you take the trouble to call. Hold these kinds of connection before God and see what "lov[ing] your neighbour as yourself" might look like. In what ways, however modest, can you help them think better of themselves and more of God after their encounter with you?

#### APOSTLE'S CREED

Deacon: We stand to declare our faith in God, made known to us as Father, Son

# We tell the story of salvation

Priest: The Lord be with you.
