

SERMON in Church is offered by Lynn.

At home, reflect on the hurt feelings of the vineyard planter in Isaiah, God cast as an eager vintner, tending his vines, providing ideal conditions, only to be crestfallen at the bitterness of the grapes. Then, in temper, he says he will destroy it and let it be over grown. Just when we think this owner is behaving like a child having a tantrum, the sonorous declaration hits home: "I expected justice of my people, but saw bloodshed; righteousness, but heard a cry." It's us he is talking about, and he is right to be angry. God has created the conditions for humanity to bear the fruit of grace and generosity, but instead we bear the bitter fruit of envy, jealousy and violence.

There is a similar shape to Jesus' parable, clearly a riff on Isaiah's love poem. He casts God as a rather naïve seeming Vineyard owner, sending servants, then his own son, expecting some basic respect at last to tame their response. With each attack, Jesus raises our indignation at the tenants. Then, in an unusual move, he gets his hearers to finish the story, asking what they think the landowner should do. They declare a brutal sentence, then in the echo that follows realise they are the tenants. Now we, his readers, are the tenants. At least we are whenever we behave proprietorially, possessively, threateningly, whenever we bear bitter fruit of greed. As Black History Month begins, we may reflect on the times Christian Imperial Britain has asserted herself proprietorially, stealing and enslaving, becoming not the bringers of a Christian grace, but would be proprietors making Christianity look like the problem. Blue plaques are being added to some of the great buildings of that period explaining the dubious origins of the money and ideology that

built them. This information does not destroy the buildings, but layers our understanding of them and might prompt a re-direction of energies that we use them for more gracious purposes in future.

The religious leaders were meant to be part of the solution, keeping the people in touch with God's grace. Instead, they had become possessive of power, preferring resentment and judgmentalism over grace and forgiveness. This teaching follows the day after Jesus' controversial overturning of the tables in the temple and his assertion that noisy children and the people excluded on the grounds of disability should be allowed in. He is telling this vineyard parable in the heart of Israel, the very place where the authorities felt most in charge.

St Paul, meanwhile, is under house arrest, Rome wanting him to feel they are in charge. They cannot, however, take charge of his imagination. Imprisoned, he talks triumphantly of running a race. He talks of being conformed to Christ's death — Rome's ultimate sanction, and way of getting people to conform to their agenda. He counts his own educational qualifications as crap (perhaps a more accurate translation than "dross" or "loss") compared to the awe of knowing God in Christ.

In a week where an Iranian woman Narges Mohammadi is awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for her resistance to a brutal, patriarchal religious regime, Paul may prompt us to rejoice at her resilience of imagination, a truer witness to the best of Islam than the religious leaders whose brutality and misogyny has nothing whatsoever to do with God. Their Roman style efforts to control others' imagination through violence looks both dangerously ugly and feebly ineffective.

We affirm our faith

We stand and at home, if able, we turn to look in the direction of Church, to affirm our faith in God, revealed to us as Father, Son and Holy Spirit:

We pray that we may know the power of reconciliation. Wherever there is division between us and others, because of our race or ethnicity, we pray that we may all be led to reconciliation. We pray for all who work to bring communities together in ways that are just and equal for all. Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer.

As we pray for reconciliation, we pray also for restoration. We pray for those whose spirits and communities have been weighed down by racism. Guide us as we strive to ensure everyone has equal dignity. Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer.

The Table is prepared in Church. At home, now is the time to say the Lord's Prayer (below) and consume the food and drink you have prepared.

We tell the story of salvation

Priest: The Lord be with you. **All: And also with you.**

Lift up your hearts.

We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

It is right to give thanks and praise.

It is our duty and our joy to thank and praise you, Father of mercies, because when the gift of your grace was rejected by your creation people you offered it to your chosen people, and when it was rejected by your chosen people you offered it once more in your Son. When your Son was rejected and crucified you did not come in wrath but came in the power of your Holy Spirit to spread the good news of restoration, reconciliation and resurrection, beginning in Jerusalem and on to the ends of the earth. And so we stand before you not in fear of your judgement but rejoicing in your abundant mercy, joining with angels and archangels and all the company of heaven, to sing the hymn of your unending praise:

All: Holy, holy, holy Lord,

God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

You give us so much, gracious God, but everything we have is loss compared to the wondrous love we see in your Son Jesus Christ. On your Son's last night with his disciples we took away everything you gave us in him, and yet you gave us a meal. Now in this wonderful sacrament we give you everything we know how to give you, praying that you will give us Christ in the form of this meal. Send down your Holy Spirit upon us now, that we might become the body of Christ that you give us to eat. Give us your very self in these gifts of bread and wine and make them for us the body and blood of your Son Jesus Christ.

Who, at supper with his disciples, took bread, gave you thanks, broke the bread and gave it to them saying, "Take, eat: this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me."
