OLD TESTAMENT READING Isaiah 61:1-4; 8-end

The spirit of the Lord God is upon me, because the LORD has anointed me: he has sent me to bring good news to the oppressed, to bind up the broken-hearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and release to the prisoners; to proclaim the year of the LORD's favour, and the day of vengeance of our God; to comfort all who mourn; to provide for those who mourn in Zion to give them a garland instead of ashes, the oil of gladness instead of mourning, the mantle of praise instead of a faint spirit. They will be called oaks of righteousness, the planting of the LORD, to display his glory. They shall build up the ancient ruins, they shall raise up the former devastations; they shall repair the ruined cities, the devastations of many generations.

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John

All: Glory to you, O Lord.

There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light.

This is the testimony given by John when the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, 'Who are you?' He confessed and did not deny it, but confessed, 'I am not the Messiah.' And they asked him, 'What then? Are you Elijah?' He said, 'I am not.' 'Are you the prophet?' He answered, 'No.' Then they said to him, 'Who are you? Let us have an answer for those who sent us. What do you say about yourself?' He said,

'I am the voice of one crying out in the wilderness, "Make straight the way of the Lord" ', as the prophet Isaiah said.

Now they had been sent from the Pharisees. They asked him, 'Why then are you baptizing if you are neither the Messiah, nor Elijah, nor the prophet?' John answered them, 'I baptize with water. Among you stands one whom you do not know, the one who is coming after me; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandal.' This took place in Bethany across the Jordan where John was baptizing.

At the end This is the Gospel of the Lord All: Praise to you, O Christ.

SERMON in Church is from David

For those at home: hear again from Isaiah: "I, the Lord, love justice." (61:8)

There have been some months of debate whether the government was presenting an illegal immigration....bill, or an illegal...immigration bill.

Our foreign secretary sternly told Israel this week to adhere to international law, then rushed back to vote on the said bill with which the government says we will "disapply" elements of our own human rights act. When we have to invent a word like "disapply," we have probably already admitted to ourselves that we are doing something wrong. Some politicians were proud and delighted to leave Europe and are very eager to loosen all ties with the European standards on human rights, including the right to family life. This is taking effect now as some seek to forbid people from overseas, working here on average salaries, from bringing their family to live with them. If any party claims to be the party of Law and Order we might want to shine an even brighter light on them to check. Wherever we are on the political spectrum and whether we think the Rwanda policy is a good idea or a disgrace, we surely find Isaiah's words clarifying.

That God loves justice shines light on the murky machinations of this week. That God's kingdom proclaims release to captives shines light on the suicide of a migrant imprisoned on the Bibby Stockholm barge this week.

That God longs to bind up the broken hearted highlights the bleakness of that place.

Meanwhile we wonder which destroyed or dangerous cities and communities those incarcerated on the barge have fled from. They must wonder if they will ever be rebuilt. We surely wonder if Gaza can ever be rebuilt. It's hard to imagine as we look helplessly at every smashed up building and rubble strewn street. But Isaiah, in no less bleak a time, insists that they can. He speaks of God's "recompense" and "vengeance," only to startle us with the fact that for God they are expressed not in destruction but rebuilding; not in violence, but in healing and growth. Justice for God it seems is a minimum standard of behaviour. S/He expresses "vengeance" for past wrong by giving a new start. Built upon a foundational judgement of justice, God then proceeds to build an edifice of grace. The Anointed One whom John announces will likewise set a baseline of justice. (In Luke particularly he re-sets our understanding of the relationship between rich and poor.) Then he will demonstrate that justice is not and end goal, but rather becomes the launching point of grace and mercy.

This all may give us pause to wonder for whom we should pray this particular week in Advent, Isaiah and John ringing in our ears.

We affirm our faith

Say the word "oppressed" several times over. See who comes to mind and pray for them, asking God: what would be good news for them?

Say the word "Captive," perhaps a few times. See who comes to mind and pray for wisdom about what "freedom" might look like for them.

Say the words "Broken-hearted" over several times. See who comes to mind and pray for them. Ask what "binding up" might be for them, and who might be needed to do it.

Pray by for any politicians you support, saying after each name: "God, you love justice."

Help us to love justice."

Pray for any politicians with whom you disagree, saying after each name "God, you love justice."

In his death you dismantle the power of death and in his resurrection you raise up the joy of everlasting life. And so we greatly rejoice and exult with our whole being in the sanctified company of angels and archangels of heaven, joining the unending hymn.

Abiding God, you made an everlasting covenant with your people, and when that covenant was jeopardized you sent your Son Jesus. In bread and wine he re-enacted your Passover promises and became the Lamb of God that takes away our sin. Send now your Holy Spirit on us that we may hold fast to what is good and live in the freedom of being your children. Send your Spirit upon this bread and this cup that they may be for us the body and blood of your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord. Who, at supper with his disciples, took bread, gave you thanks, broke the bread and gave it to them saying, "Take, eat: this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup. Again he gave you thanks, and gave it to his disciples saying, "Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me."

Deacon: Great is the mystery of faith:

All: Christ has died; Christ is risen; Christ will come again.

God of justice, send your Spirit upon your people in their wilderness. Bring good news to the oppressed and all who live with the chains of debt. Bind up the broken hearted and any who languish in the slavery of another's scheming or the rule of their

own folly. Proclaim liberty to the captives and those who live under the shadow of fear at home, at work or in their neighbourhood. Announce release to the prisoners and to all who are incarcerated by their own body or the travails of their own mind. Usher in the year of your favour and deliver your people from sin and guilt and addiction and shame. Provide for those who mourn, that they may have a garland instead of ashes and the oil of gladness instead of mourning. Show us your face, everlasting God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. **Amen**.

THE LORD'S PRAYER

Deacon: As our Saviour taught us, so we pray:

Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us. Lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil.

For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours now and for ever. Amen.

Priest: We break this bread to share in the body of Christ.

All: Though we are many, we are one body.

For we all share in one bread.

Draw near with faith. Receive the body of our Lord Jesus Christ which he gave for you and his blood which he shed for you. Eat and drink in remembrance that he died and now lives for you, and feed on him in your heart by faith with thanksgiving.

We sing: Jesus, Lamb of God: have mercy on us.

Jesus, bearer of our sins: have mercy on us.

Jesus, redeemer of the world: grant us peace. (Shephard)

We pause to remember all who pray at home, then share the bread and wine, now for us the body and blood of Christ.
