The Word of God

OLD TESTAMENT READING Isaiah 64:1-9

O that you would tear open the heavens and come down, so that the mountains would quake at your presence—

as when fire kindles brushwood

and the fire causes water to boil—

to make your name known to your adversaries, so that the nations might tremble at your presence!

When you did awesome deeds that we did not expect, you came down, the mountains quaked at your presence.

From ages past no one has heard,

no ear has perceived,

no eye has seen any God besides you, who works for those who wait for him.

You meet those who gladly do right, those who remember you in your ways.

But you were angry, and we sinned; because you hid yourself we transgressed.

We have all become like one who is unclean, and all our righteous deeds are like a filthy cloth.

We all fade like a leaf,

and our iniquities, like the wind, take us away.

There is no one who calls on your name, or attempts to take hold of you;

for you have hidden your face from us, and have delivered us into the hand of our iniquity.

Yet, O LORD, you are our Father; we are the clay, and you are our potter;

we are all the work of your hand.

Do not be exceedingly angry, O LORD, and do not remember iniquity for ever. Now consider, we are all your people.

PSALM 80:1-8 If you are able, you might stand to read this psalm aloud.

Give ear, O Shepherd of Israel, you who lead Joseph like a flock! You who are enthroned upon the cherubim, shine forth before Ephraim and Benjamin and Manasseh. Stir up your might, and come to save us! Restore us, O God; let your face shine, that we may be saved. O LORD God of hosts, how long will you be angry with your people's prayers? You have fed them with the bread of tears, and given them tears to drink in full measure. You make us the scorn of our neighbours; our enemies laugh among themselves. Restore us, O God of hosts; let your face shine, that we may be saved.

You brought a vine out of Egypt; you drove out the nations and planted it.

GOSPEL READING Mark 13:24-end

Jesus said: 'But in those days, after that suffering, the sun will be darkened, and the moon will not give its light, and the stars will be falling from heaven, and the powers in the heavens will be shaken. Then they will see "the Son of Man coming in clouds" with great power and glory. Then he will send out the angels, and gather his elect from the four winds, from the ends of the earth to the ends of heaven.

'From the fig tree learn its lesson: as soon as its branch becomes tender and puts forth its leaves, you know that summer is near. So also, when you see these things taking place, you know that he is near, at the very gates. Truly I tell you, this generation will not pass away until all these things have taken place. Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away.

'But about that day or hour no one knows, neither the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. Beware, keep alert; for you do not know when the time will come. It is like a man going on a journey, when he leaves home and puts his slaves in charge, each with his work, and commands the doorkeeper to be on the watch. Therefore, keep awake—for you do not know when the master

of the house will come, in the evening, or at midnight, or at cockcrow, or at dawn, or else he may find you asleep when he comes suddenly. And what I say to you I say to all: Keep awake.'

AFFIRMATION OF FAITH We stand if able and turn to look in the direction of Church, to emphasise our gathering around a precious, shared story:

We declare our faith in the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ:

Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures; he was buried; he was raised to life on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures; afterwards he appeared to his followers, and to all the apostles, this we have received and this we believe. Amen. (cf 1 Corinthians 15:3-7)

Prayers

We pray THE COLLECT for Advent Sunday

Almighty God, give us grace to cast away the works of darkness and to put on the armour of light, now in the time of this mortal life, in which your Son Jesus Christ came to us in great humility: that on the last day, when he shall come again in his glorious majesty to judge the living and the dead, we may rise to the life immortal, through him who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen**

LORD'S PRAYER

We pray with confidence as our Saviour has taught us:

All: Our Father in heaven...

FOR REFLECTION

Nearly two months of slaughter and destruction in Israel and Gaza may well make us want to scream at the sky "Why won't you tear the heavens open and come down to sort this out?"

That's not a bad prayer. It is full of lament, rage, frustration, longing. But Isaiah quite quickly moves on having got that off his chest and looks carefully into the human heart, acknowledging that the mess is the result of humanity's abuse of free will. He does pointedly make room for the possibility that it is a little bit God's fault - "Because you hid yourself, we sinned" - but overall he accepts human it's about human folly and frailty. So Isaiah asks God to come and judge the situation in such a way as to resolve conflict.

Jesus, on the other hand, warns us that God's judgement is coming, but using the image of the sleepy doorkeeper, holds up a mirror so we can see we may not really be ready to receive it. Because of our colonial, imperial, wealthy past, the church is shy of the language of judgement

and perhaps would rather not hear it. We are challenged by our readings to consider what in the world, and in our own hearts really needs to be exposed to divine judgement, and what really needs divine intervention to be resolved. Then we are challenged to think further about whether if we're honest, we really want God to intervene at all.

The contradiction is not God's. It's in our teenage human attitude: "Leave us alone, don't interfere, don't limit our freedom..."

....but then when something goes wrong we shout "why weren't you there for us? Why didn't you stop this? Why don't you sort it out?

We turn our reflection into PRAYERS:

Open your heart and mind to let crises, situations, places, institutions that may need to be exposed to God's fierce, insightful, judging gaze.

See where outstanding goodness in those difficult situations and places already reveals what needs to be put right.

Pray for those whose generous, courageous behaviour amidst conflict embodies God's judgement and sheds light.

Pray for readiness to receive the unpalatable wisdom we may need to hear if conflicts are to be resolved and human conflict with creation is to be healed.

In the Church we pray for Bishop Michael Volland, consecrated on Thursday, who will come to serve as Bishop of Birmingham early next year.

Among those who are unwell we pray for Adrian Koslowski,

Among those who have died we remember Robin Centre volunteer Greg Mason, Norman Brookes, Dorothy Jones, Eric James, Helen Hunt (from Kings Heath Cricket Club) and Pat Flynn.
