A carol service to remember

Tony Cocks acted as a sidesperson at the Kings Heath Business Association's annual carol service in early December, and was so taken by the buzz it created that he felt inspired to write this short reflection. Members of the congregation will all be more or less familiar with the usual services at All Saints – on Sundays and Wednesdays; on high days and holy days; the baptisms, weddings and funerals – but as Tony noted, not very many people at the KHBA service are regulars at the church and his intention is to draw readers' attention to what is a significant service, especially with regard to drawing in people of all ages into the church who are not ordinarily there on a regular basis; a useful reminder of the importance of All Saints to the whole community.

Imagine a church in the centre of a suburb, a Village Square sprinkled with lights in front of the church, a sleigh to one side next to the Church Centre, Father Christmas in a sleigh handing out Christmas gifts to children.

It's time, it's nearly 4:30pm. Imagine everyone is gathered – young and old, families, couples and single people of all backgrounds – waiting for the moment when the Christmas lights are to be put on. The countdown: 10, 9... 1 – the Christmas lights are switched on, a cheer.

An announcement by the Kings Heath Business Association which has set up the event: 'Everyone is welcome to the carol service in the church now, and afterwards for free food and drink.' The church is ready and warm, the Central England Concert Band is playing festive Christmas melodies and well-known carols, the band seated in the front of the nave under the control of the conductor. The carol service sheets have been prepared and are ready in a box by the entrance.

After the announcement, there is a flood of people into the church, adults and children alike, numerous pushchairs, too many to count. The service sheets are handed out as fast as possible and people pile into the church, filling it to the brim; 20 minutes later all the seats are filled, people are sitting on anything available including tables at the side, some are standing at the back, all waiting now for the service to start and listening to the festive music – 280 people counted, including 70 children.

Perhaps the first time in a church building for some children and most of the people not recognised as regular visitors to the church – they only come perhaps two or three times a year. The children's area is a hive of industry, with crayoning, paper cutting and so on, some just sitting with their parents, some too young to be involved in the action.

The traditional carol service lead by our vicar David and assistant curate Tariro commences, readings telling the Advent of Jesus and the events leading up to the birth on Christmas Day, well-known carols being sung to the accompaniment of the band, a sermon and prayers.

The service ends, and food is served at the back of the church: curried chicken and rice, bolognese and pasta and a veggie option, drinks are poured – oodles of coke and lemonade, children coming back for more; and also wine and beer available.

Eventually everyone is satisfied and retires to wherever they reside, the church is cleared, it is quiet once more – in the peace, there can be seen the glint of light off the image of the crucifixion on the screen at the rear of the high altar: a moment to reflect.

Carol singing, and carol identifying...

With Christmas Eve falling on a Sunday in 2023, our annual Village Square carol singing took place on Saturday 23 December, when what we think was a record number of singers from All Saints and beyond worked their way enthusiastically through the carol booklets, as ever interspersed with a few requests from those passing by. We tried positioning ourselves in a couple of different locations, although footfall on the High Street and through the Square seemed lower than in previous years; nevertheless we were very pleased to raise £110 over 75 minutes or so, which has been donated to Birmingham Christmas Shelter and gratefully acknowledged by its trustees.

Since 1974 Birmingham Christmas Shelter has been raising funds and recruiting volunteers to provide local adults who are homeless or otherwise alone at Christmas with a free warm, safe and welcoming place to eat, shower, sleep and enjoy Christmas. Every year doors are open to their guests (typically between 50 and 150 per day, staffed by 50 volunteers) for several days and nights during the Christmas week, with food, warmth, companionship, shelter, entertainment and as many additional services as possible provided. What everyone wants from a service?


A couple of things spotted recently on Facebook, and posted (tongue in cheek, of course) without comment...

Wave of Prayer

Margaret Healey-Pollett has sent us the email below from the Sabeel-Kairos organisation (<u>https://www.sabeel-kairos.org.uk/</u>). She writes: 'It contains the prayers of the Sabeel Community in Jerusalem for Thursday 1 February. Prayers for noon on Thursdays are circulated every week, so that churches around the world can join with the Palestinian Christians in Jerusalem. They inform our prayers from the heart of Palestinian suffering.' Margaret has suggested reproducing this prayer for the magazine.







The Wave of Prayer ministry enables local and international friends of Sabeel to pray over regional concerns on a weekly basis. Sent to Sabeel's network of supporters, the prayer is used in services around the world and during Sabeel's Thursday Communion service; as each community in its respective time zone lifts these concerns in prayer at noon every Thursday, this 'wave of prayer' washes over the world.



Sabeel Wave of Prayer - Thursday 1st February 2024

On Friday the 26th of January, the International Court of Justice (ICJ) delivered its ruling on the emergency measures requested by South Africa in its genocide case against Israel. The court has ordered Israel to take measures to prevent acts of genocide in Gaza, to prevent and punish incitement to genocide in Gaza, to allow humanitarian aid into Gaza, obliges Israel to take more measures to protect Palestinians, but has not ordered an immediate ceasefire.

• God of light, whilst there are split reactions regarding the ICJ's ruling, Gaza is being bombed and millions are suffering. Lord, we pray for an increase of activism which calls for accountability concerning injustice and an immediate ceasefire. Let us remember the words of the Apostle Paul, "And as for you, brothers and sisters, never tire of doing what is good" (2 Thessalonians 3:13).

Lord in your mercy... hear our prayer

Last week, 42-year-old Lara Tannous who worked as a pharmacist at a Jerusalem hospital died from her wounds sustained by a shooting nearly three weeks ago. Amar Mansour, aged 32, was also killed during the attack. The shooters have yet to be identified, however, local sources claim that the shooting was by Israeli settlers. The Palestinian Christian community is in mourning as Tannous was a beloved and admired figure in the community.

• God of love, we come before you saddened by the loss of Tannous and Mansour. We lift up their families who are mourning, and we pray that they may feel your love during these difficult times. Lord, whilst we have little hope that injustice will be accounted for, we lift up our grievances in lament that you shall hold all preparators and enablers of injustice accountable.

Lord in your mercy... hear our prayer

In the past week, Khan Yunis has been a target of bombings and military operations. Many displaced Gazans who sought shelter in Khan Yunis were ordered to flee by the Israeli military, causing mass panic and adding to the hellish humanitarian conditions. Moreover, the Nasser hospital in Khan Yunis has been raided and bombed severely, causing 95% of the hospital staff to flee to Rafah, according to local sources. The complete extent of suffering in Khan Yunis is not yet known.

• God of justice, we are shaken by the few reports that have come out from Khan Yunis. Whilst it seems you are absent from the people in Gaza, we hold on to our faith that, "The Lord works righteousness and justice for all the oppressed" (Psalm 106:3). Lord, take care of your children in Gaza who are suffering so terribly, and help us advocate their cause in our daily lives.

Lord in your mercy... hear our prayer

On the 27th of January, marked the international day in memory of the victims of the Holocaust. This day commemorates the victims of the Holocaust, which resulted in the genocide of one third of the Jewish people, along with countless members of other minorities by Nazi Germany between 1933 and 1945.

• Almighty God, we lament the many lives lost in the Holocaust who were victims of supremacist and racist ideologies. Help us remember and recognize the sanctity of each human life, that all people are made in your image. We pray that genocide and hatred will be cease, and that love will triumph over evil. Never again means never again for anybody. Lord, we pray for an immediate ceasefire.

Lord in your mercy... hear our prayer

Friends of Sabeel North America participated on the 24th of January in an interfaith event for Gaza which focused on liberation, lament, and learning. Sabeel-Kairos UK were a part of several protests in different cities in the UK calling for ceasefire and a free Palestine. All our friends abroad have demonstrated a Christian voice for Palestine in their respective contexts.

• Everlasting God, we thank you for the solidarity around the globe. We remember that "The righteous care about justice for the poor, but the wicked have no such concern" (Proverbs 29:7). Lord, increase the activism around the globe of those who are righteously standing for justice for the Palestinian people and courageously exposing how the wicked are complicit in the suffering of so many.

Lord in your mercy... hear our prayer

Last week, Churches around the world marked a week of ecumenical prayer for Christian unity. The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is traditionally observed from the 18th to the 25th of January. In Palestine, the services occurred in the Church of the Resurrection, St. James Cathedral, Church of the Redeemer, St. George's Cathedral, and other Churches sacred to various denominations.

• God of inclusivity, we are encouraged to see the Churches praying with one another in the spirit of ecumenism. Lord, we pray for unity which is not rooted in the interests of preserving the institution's legitimacy and life, but a unity which can raise the voice of those unheard and rejected. Let the Churches work together with God in our hope and commitment to confront injustice and oppression in all its forms.

From the PCC

I wish a happy new year to all readers.

Since the last issue of *Saints Alive!*, there has been one meeting of the Standing Committee in December last and one meeting of the PCC this January. The PCC meeting in particular was very lively with an almost record number of members attending. We also welcomed one new member, Sarah Baker.

There were a number of topics discussed and a résumé of these is given below.

Finance:

Expenditure: Our treasurer reported that expenditure for the full year to the end of December 2023 was circa £146K.

<u>Income</u>: The treasurer reported that income for the full year to the end of December 2023 was circa £185K but it did include a bequest of circa £41K.

<u>Regular giving</u>: The treasurer reported that the average for the past 12 months was some £713/month more than the average a year ago and exceeds last month's average.

<u>Overall net worth:</u> The treasurer reported that the account at the end of the year was some £39K in credit which he was very pleased with being much more than expected.

<u>Christmas collections</u>: The treasurer said that the amount to be allotted to each of the three chosen charities at Christmas is currently being determined.

<u>John Watling</u>: John, a member of the church for many years and who has also been on the finance team as income officer for many years, has now retired from the team. David Warbrick has written a letter of thanks to John for the many years of dedicated and invaluable work that he has provided over the period to support the team.

John Watling replacement: John's retirement means that there is now a vacancy on the team which requires filling. A job description is being prepared to help facilitate this.

<u>Blue Envelopes</u>: it was recommended that the Blue Envelope scheme for giving should be phased out. There are now only a small number of people using the scheme and only a smaller number Gift Aid. Consideration during the transition to be given to using just small brown envelopes with the All Saints identification on.

<u>Homeless charity</u>: David, our vicar, said that Dave Priday, the site facilities manager, has been in contact with a charity which helps homeless people and has assisted with the help of Brumside Radio in three persons being found permanent accommodation. David said that he would like All Saints to contribute to this charity. There was general agreement to this proposal.

Safeguarding: Our safeguarding co-ordinator, Eira Jones, reported that she is currently undertaking the diocesan training and Mary Miles is assisting her in familiarising herself with how to use and how to update the parish dashboard.

DBS administrator assistance: David commented that DBS administration is very intermittent but it is important that it happens so that the All Saints position is secure. Angela, our parish administrator, does not have the capacity to fulfil this roll. Vicki Willinger, the office co-ordinator for the Youth Project, has offered to undertake this work. Angela would continue to maintain the safeguarding records.

Churchwardens: A replacement or replacements for the last churchwarden, Chris Pearce, is still being sought for the role. David explained that he has made some progress on this but more as a medium-term possibility. He did stress that there is a statutory requirement to have churchwardens in place which will be particularly important for when he goes on sabbatical for three months this May.

New PCC member: Sarah Baker, a member of the church, said that she would like to join the PCC. There was unanimous approval from the PCC to this and Sarah was welcomed by all to this new and important role. New members are always welcome as they bring in new ideas and maintain the balance of age and experience within the members to keep the church a vibrant place for all.

All Saints Community Development Company (ASCDC): The team progressing the application for the Government Youth Investment Fund grant (YIF) reported that the application and the proposals are progressing well but there are some outstanding issues still being resolved. Consideration is being given as to how the construction work to complete the development can proceed without adversely affect the functioning of the site during this time. The ASCDC AGM is scheduled to take place in the church on Tuesday 27 February.

Ministry Team: It was reported that there have been no further meetings of the Ministry Team since the last PCC meeting.

Deanery Synod: It was reported that there have been no further meetings of the Deanery Synod since the last PCC meeting. The next meeting is scheduled for February.

All Saints Community Projects (ASCP) – Youth Project: It was reported that a large grant which had recently been received would make a big difference to enable this important work to continue. Brenda Inman has now been elected as chair of the Youth Management Committee and Mary Miles will continue as chair of the ASCP board.

The Robin Centre: It was reported that The Robin Centre is going well and currently has 14 members. The break-even number is 11. They could do with more volunteers to assist with running the Centre. The completion of the new development which provides additional space for the Centre would be a great advantage.

All Saints Community Catering (ASCC): It was reported that at this time there is nothing specific to report on.

All Saints Community Arts (ASCA): It was reported that the complete set of new sculpted crib figures has now been presented to the congregation and dedicated during the Christmas Eve afternoon service. The creation of the figures was financed by money raised by the Crafters. It was commented that it is impressive that the Crafters have been so successful in raising so much from selling jam, chutney and knitted figures. Discussion took place regarding the old crib figures but there was no conclusive decision made. If anyone reading this would be interested in them please contact David or the Parish Office.

Wedding festival: Consideration is being given to a wedding festival to be held in the church later in the year. It would be to celebrate 163 years of love and commitment in our community since the church was first dedicated. With regard to timing, it was considered that after the return of David from his sabbatical was preferred; possibly the first Sunday in October. It would probably be a free event but with an option for people to donate as they felt appropriate.

Tea, Cake and Music (TCM): It was reported that TCM was initially very successful, getting good attendance. However, it has never really recovered after Covid. As such it has been decided not to continue with it. It would appear however that the community lunch held on a Monday is by contrast proving very popular and can have as many as 70 attendees.

Archiving: It was reported that the archiving of historic documentation currently stored on the site accumulated by former members of the church is progressing. The group led by Vivien Tilsley is at the stage where they need assistance in writing bids as the group has little experience of this.

Air entering heating system: In the absence of a churchwarden, our PCC secretary explained that this is currently on hold until after Easter when the weather is more suited to undertaking the external work required, which is to provide access to the pipework on the outside on the church. Following this, the method of the repair can be finalised and costed and completed in the summer when the heating can be switched off.

A talk at All Saints Church by Jim Andrew on Saturday March 9th at 3pm in the Church




Sarehole Mill is situated on the Ring Road between Kings Heath and Hall Green

High days and holy days

13 February (this year) – Shrove Tuesday (Pancake Day)

Ever wonder why we eat pancakes just before Lent? The tradition dates back to Anglo-Saxon times, when Christians spent Lent in repentance and severe fasting. On the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday, the church bell would summon them to confession, where they would be 'shriven', or absolved from their sins, which gives us Shrove Tuesday. At home, they would then eat up their last eggs and fat, and making a pancake was the easiest way to do this.

Pancakes feature in cookery books as far back as 1439, and today's pancake races are in remembrance of a panicked woman back in 1445 in Olney, Buckinghamshire. She was making pancakes when she heard the shriving bell calling her to confession. Afraid she'd be late, she ran to the church in a panic, still in her apron, and still holding the pan. Flipping pancakes is also centuries old. A poem from *Pasquil's Palin* in 1619 runs: 'And every man and maide doe take their turne, / And tosse their Pancakes up for feare they burne.' Some people have noted that the ingredients of pancakes can be used to highlight four significant things about this time of year: eggs stand for creation, flour is the staff of life, while salt keeps things wholesome and milk stands for purity.

14 February (this year) – Ash Wednesday: mourning our sins

Lent begins with Ash Wednesday. But why 'Ash' Wednesday? The reason has to do with getting things right between you and God, and the tradition goes right back to the Old Testament, when the Israelites often sinned; when they finally came to their senses, and saw their evil ways as God saw them, they could do nothing but repent in sorrow. They mourned for the damage and evil they had done. As part of this repentance, they covered their heads with ashes. For the Israelites, putting ashes on your head, and even rending your clothes, was an outward sign of their heartfelt repentance and acknowledgement of sin. In the very early Christian Church, the yearly 'class' of penitents had ashes sprinkled over them at the beginning of Lent. They were turning to God for the first time, and mourning their sins. But soon many other Christians wanted to take part in the custom, and to do so at the very start of Lent. They heeded Joel's call to 'rend your hearts and not your garments'; Ash Wednesday became known as either the 'beginning of the fast' or 'the day of the ashes'.

The actual custom of 'ashing' was abolished at the Reformation, though the old name for the day remained. Throughout the Church of England today, receiving the mark of ashes on one's forehead is optional. Certainly, the mark of ashes on the forehead reminds people of their mortality. The late medieval custom was to burn the branches used on Palm Sunday in the previous year in order to create the ashes for today.

The collect for Ash Wednesday stresses the penitential character of the day. It encourages us with the reminder of the readiness of God to forgive us and to renew us:

Almighty and everlasting God, you hate nothing that you have made and forgive the sins of all those who are penitent: create and make in us new and contrite hearts that we, worthily lamenting our sins and acknowledging our wretchedness, may receive from you, the God of all mercy, perfect remission and forgiveness; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.
