Holy Communion First Sunday of Lent, 18th February 2024

We gather

If you are worshipping at home, have ready in an honoured place a portion of food and something to drink. It may be bread and wine or something else. Set your Bible alongside. You might light a candle.

SERMON in Church is from Lynn Busfield.

At home, spend some time remembering times you have seen a rainbow and how it made you feel. Turn over in your mind the liminal moment it represents, when it is still raining, but the sun begins to assert itself from behind you. here is a passage from a reflection David shared some years ago on the Genesis story.

Curtains of rain swept across the Fowey estuary most of the day. Across on the Fowey side, waves reaching in past the narrow neck of the inlet thudded against the rocks. High above an elegant Victorian esplanade stood unmoved by the surge, but windows, no doubt, rattling in the wind. Surprisingly often, sun broke through enough over the hunched hill on the East side where the village of Polruan shelters in a curve reminiscent of a child's shoulder protecting exam answers from prying eyes. Viewed from there, rainbows kept appearing, sometimes several at a time, over the river. One sat there doggedly for half an hour. Whatever the weather, that view, that inlet, holds the tender feeling of human courage and foolhardiness; of strength and vulnerability. For the inscrutable sea is so serene, then so terrifying by turns. The protective harbour stirs primeval feelings of survival, haven, danger. The narrow mouth of the estuary suggests an intimacy Freud might have something to say about, although for him probably the danger would be inside. The high elegant houses and the stocky trawlers heading out to sea are differently defiant; differently foolhardy.

The quay with quaint pub, and moored fishing boats seem benign. The remains of block house towers on either side of the estuary recall the chains pulled across to break the masts of invading ships, evoking centuries of human conflict generated as if the sea were not threat enough. To and fro in all weathers, the little orange ferry ploughs its way seriously, tiny but determined.

So when rainbows appear over that estuary, smudging the unseeing town with pride colours, all the severity and tenderness of God and the courage and foolishness of humanity is stirred to new depths.

[With current violence in the region Noah settled] it is heart rending to picture God's bow, a weapon bent, not in aggression, but upwards to the sky, with disarmingly camp colours, an exquisite, tear jerking emblem of peace between God and creation. Like the harbour, it highlights how beautiful is human tenacity; how dismaying is human violence.

Bring to mind the places cursed with weaponry and prepare to pray for them.

We affirm our faith

INTERCESSIONS

At home, pray for the rainbow to appear in whatever guise needed over the places of conflict you thought about before.

Turning then to Jesus' testing in the wilderness, pray for some of the people whom you observe seeking power in inappropriate or self-seeking ways. Acknowledging that if Jesus was tempted in that way, it's not altogether surprising that we might, so see if you can pray with some sympathy and concern for their well being.

In the Church we continue to pray for Bishop Michael preparing to be installed as our Bishop in a few weeks time, that in Lent he will find God gives him all he needs to begin his new role with gladness.

Among those in our community and networks who are unwell, we remember Mike and Rosie Cross.

Among those who have died, we remember Ingrid Patrick, Gordon Middleton and Suzy Singh.

THE PEACE

Deacon: Christ came to preach peace to those who are far off and peace to

those who are near. The Peace of the Lord be always with you.

And also with you.

Let us offer one another a sign of peace.

God, whose Spirit unites and inspires us, with this symbolic meal bind me into the fellowship of the world wide church, and assure me of my place in your heart. **Amen**.

We tell the story of God's faithfulness

In Church we stand, if able, for the Eucharistic Prayer

Priest: The Lord is here.

All: His Spirit is with us.

Lift up your hearts.

We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give thanks and praise.

Blessed are you, God of everlasting covenant, for your promises are steadfast and your provision is sure. Through your people's desert of forty years you were constant in fire and cloud; with manna and mercy you sustained every step. You made Jesus' temptation of forty days a theatre of truth where your Word stood strong. In every age you have shaped your people through times of wilderness and wandering, of temptation and trial, and brought them into the land of promise and the life of covenant. And so with all who have walked the wilderness way in every time and all who walk it this day, with angels and archangels wand all the company of heaven, we join the unending hymn:

All: Holy, holy, holy Lord,

God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest.

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

Enduring God, as you sustained Jesus in hunger and thirst, through this meal strengthen us to keep our Lenten fast. Send your Holy Spirit upon us as we remember Jesus' saving passion; transform our insatiable desires into hunger for the feast of this table. Send your Holy Spirit upon this bread and wine that they may be for us the body and blood of Christ. Who, at supper with his disciples, took bread, gave you thanks, broke the bread, and gave it to them, sating, "take, eat: this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me."

A bell is rung.

After supper he took the cup. Again he gave you thanks and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Drink this, all of you: this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me."

A bell is rung.

Deacon: Great is the mystery of faith:

All: Christ has died, Christ is risen, Christ will come again.

Forgiving God, in this season of repentance, make your mercy sufficient for every need. Come to your children who are in their own wilderness and make their wanderings holy paths of learning your truth. Strengthen all who face the threshold of temptation or

the tumult of trial. Seek those whose hearts are contrite and meet them with grace. Come alongside your children who suffer under the sin of another and give them power to live as your beloved sons and daughters. Renew your church from the depths of your heart where justice and mercy meet. Bring us with all your saints to the day when all who watch and pray for your kingdom behold your salvation and meet you in your resurrection, God most glorious, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. **Amen.**

THE LORD'S PRAYER

Deacon: As our Saviour taught us, so we pray:

Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name,

your kingdom come,

your will be done, on earth as in heaven.

Give us today our daily bread.

Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us.

Lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil.

For the kingdom, the power,

and the glory are yours now and for ever. Amen.

Priest: We break this bread to share in the body of Christ.

All: Though we are many, we are one body.

For we all share in one bread.

Draw near with faith. Receive the body of our Lord Jesus Christ which he gave for you. Eat in remembrance that he died for you and feed on him in your hearts with thanksgiving.

Jesus, Lamb of God: have mercy on us.

Jesus, bearer of our sins: have mercy on us. Jesus, redeemer of the world: grant us peace.

We share the bread and wine, now for us the body and blood of Christ. All are welcome to receive. If you prefer not to share the common cup, receiving just the bread is as much communion as receiving both. If you prefer not to receive but would value a prayer of blessing do come forward and simply keep your hands by your sides. We will pray for you.

For the sake of those with gluten intolerance, please do not dip your wafer in the wine.
