Mothering Sunday Holy Communion

Fourth Sunday of Lent, 10th March 2024

We gather

If you are worshipping at home, have ready in an honoured place a portion of food and something to drink. It may be bread and wine or something else. Set your Bible alongside. You might light a candle. Perhaps today you might also place some flowers or another thing you find simply beautiful.

Today the Royal School of Church Music is celebrating Women Composer Sunday, and we have chosen music to reflect this - the congregational hymns have all either been composed, or had texts written or translated, by women writers, and we sing two anthems by women composers: before the service we sing *Come together everybody* which our own Sarah Baker wrote for the 2022 Commonwealth Games (2024's Commonwealth Day is tomorrow); and, during communion, *Peace I leave with you* by Amy Beach (1867-1944), who composed the first symphony by an American woman to be published.

The work of women composers is becoming increasingly prominent in the canon of church music, and it is notable that a lot of the new pieces that we discover (and a few of the old) come from women writers, but there is certainly much more out there - if you have ideas of music written by women, or indeed by any people who have traditionally been marginalised, then do please let us know.

In our liturgy today at several points we change the default setting male nouns and pronouns for female when referring to God who, Genesis says, made us in God's image, male and female. This is not to cajole anyone, but is a simple invitation to explore how our language enriches or limits our understanding of God.

REFLECTION for those at home:

Think how the three nameless women, mother, sister and princess, saved Moses and made the whole story of faith that led to Jesus possible. In different ways, their knowing, patient, non-violent resistance to the brutality of Pharaoh pushes him comically into the background. Mary, whose name we do know, made Jesus possible in her unique way with physical gestation and spiritual nurture. She also bore the burden every parent carries: fear of loss. We glimpse how fear became a terrible reality for her as she witnesses her son's execution. We are moved by the re-forming of family around her, John adopting her as mother. We may wonder who else surrounded Moses' courageous protectors and supported them in their worry, grief, responsibility and letting go.

Think about those whose protection, nurture and maybe courage have made you possible.

We affirm our faith

AFFIRMATION of FAITH At home, if you are able, you might stand and turn in the direction of Church.

Deacon: We stand to affirm our faith in the motherhood of God as

portrayed by St Anselm:

Jesus, like a mother you gather your people to you; you are gentle with us as a mother with her children.

Often you weep over our sins and our pride, Tenderly you draw us from hatred and judgement.

You comfort us in sorrow and bind up our wounds; in sickness you nurse us, and with pure milk you feed us.

Jesus, by your dying we are born to new life; By your anguish and labour we come forth in joy.

Despair turns to hope through your sweet goodness; through your gentleness we find comfort in fear.

Your warmth gives life to the dead, Your touch makes sinners righteous.

Lord Jesus, in your mercy heal us; in your love and tenderness remake us.

In your compassion bring grace and forgiveness; for the beauty of heaven may your love prepare us.

We celebrate God's faithfulness

We stand, if able, for the Eucharistic Prayer

Priest: The Lord is here.

All: God's Spirit is with us.

Lift up your hearts.

We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to our Mothering God. It is right to give thanks and praise.

Blessed are you, Lord God, our light and our salvation; to you be glory and praise for ever.

From the beginning you have created all things and all your works echo the silent music of your praise. In the fullness of time you made us in your image, the crown of all creation.

You give us breath and speech that with angels and archangels and all the powers of heaven we may find a voice to sing your praise:

All: Holy, holy, holy Lord.

God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

How wonderful the works of your hands, O Lord.
As a mother tenderly gathers her children,
you embraced a people as your own.

Father, we plead with confidence his sacrifice made once for all upon the cross; we remember his dying and rising in glory, and we rejoice that he intercedes for us at your right hand. Pour out your Spirit as we bring before you these gifts of your creation; may they be for us the body and blood of your dear Son. As we eat and drink these holy things in your presence form us in the likeness of Christ, and build us into a living temple to your glory. Remember, Lord, your church in every land. Reveal her unity, quard her faith and preserve her in peace. Bring us at last with Mary and all the saints to the vision of that eternal splendour for which you have created us; through Jesus Christ our Lord, by whom and with whom and in whom, with all who stand before you in earth and heaven, we worship you, Father almighty, in songs of everlasting praise.

All: Blessing and honour and glory and power be yours for ever and ever. Amen.

THE LORD'S PRAYER

Deacon:

As our Saviour taught us, each in our mother tongue, we pray:

Our Mother in heaven, hallowed be your name,

your kingdom come, your will be done,

on earth as in heaven.

Give us today our daily bread.

Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us.

Lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil.

For the kingdom, the power,

and the glory are yours now and for ever. Amen.

Priest:

We break this bread to share in the body of Christ.

All:

Though we are many, we are one body.

For we all share in one bread.

Draw near with faith. Receive the body of our Lord Jesus Christ which he gave for you, and his blood which he shed for you. Eat and drink in remembrance that he died for you and feed on him in your hearts with thanksgiving.

Jesus, Lamb of God: have mercy on us.

Jesus, bearer of our sins: have mercy on us. Jesus, redeemer of the world: grant us peace.

We pause to remember all who pray at home, then share the bread and wine, now for us the body and blood of Christ. All are welcome to receive. If you prefer not to share the common cup, receiving just the bread is as much communion as receiving both. If you prefer not to receive but would value a prayer of blessing do come forward and simply keep your hands by your sides. We will pray for you.

For the sake of those with gluten intolerance, please do not dip your wafer in the wine.

Today, all are invited to receive flowers from the servers after you have received communion or a blessing.

ANTHEM during Communion

May Christ give us grace to grow in holiness, to deny ourselves, take up our cross and follow him: and the blessing of God almighty, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, be among us and remain with us always.
