SERMON in Church is from David

For those at home:

Do you like grilled fish? One wonders what the room smelled like when Jesus appeared to the disciples. If they have been locked away for a few days and cooking fish it might have been a bit whiffy. There is something almost comical about the detail Luke shares. The disciples must have told him when he became a follower of the way and began his research for the Gospel. Fish, though, was a staple food in the region of Lake Galilee and source of income for Peter and others. Early in the Gospel, Jesus had said to Peter, "from now on you will be catching people" (5:10). Sure enough, in Acts we see exactly that happening. Peter's vocation has transformed, his horizons have grown, expanded along with his

confidence. His generous, self-effacing speech in Acts rings with trust in the risen Jesus. He helps us recognise the gravity of Jesus' words "you are witnesses of these things." The Greek word witnesses is Martures, giving us the word Martyr. He has proved himself to be the crucified, risen Jesus of Nazareth, showing them his hands and his sides, eating (as ghosts can't do) and describing the long story of his Hebrew people, making absolute sense of who he is and what he points forward to. He has "opened their minds to understand the scriptures" in Luke's account, which is another angle on John's description of Jesus breathing on them so they would receive the Holy Spirit. All this makes them "witnesses". This word points in two directions: back to past events. They have seen and can confirm the truth of what they have seen. This is what "witness" tends to evoke in English. But it also points forwards to what the disciples will be and say. They will live lives that show all this to be true. They will be people whose lives make sense only because Jesus was who he was, died as he did, rose as he did, and now is who he is for ever. Witness is not only a word about confirmation of evidence. It is also "Martyrdom," that is, living in such a way that shows your beliefs to have integrity, even to the point of being willing to die rather than abandon those beliefs. Indeed that turned out to be the result for most of the group Jesus ate fish with that day, but enough survived for the church to grow exponentially and for the truths of his life, death and resurrection to be transmitted boldly around the world and down the centuries.

Being martures today may rarely involve such extreme sacrifice in our culture, but we are still called to witness in both directions, just as they were: telling the story and living lives whose integrity is anchored in Jesus. The comical detail of the fish brings this sense of witness right into the mundane detail of our ordinary hidden life, not just the big moments like Peter's speech in the public square. The fact that witness has for too many people meant suffering and death should heighten, not hinder our sense that it is a powerful word for us in peace time. What does it mean where I am to live as one who trusts in the risen Christ?

We affirm our faith

We stand and at home, if able, we turn to look in the direction of Church, to affirm our faith in God, revealed to us as Father, Son and Holy Spirit:

We believe in God the Son, who lives in our hearts through faith and fills us with his love.

We believe in God the Holy Spirit, who strengthens us with power from on high.

We believe in one God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Amen.

We tell the story of salvation

Priest: The Lord is here.

All: God's Spirit is with us.

We lift them to the Lord.

It is right to give thanks and praise.

Re-creating God, when your Son came to restore your purpose for the earth, he took the fruit of your abundance and the food of human labour. Who, at supper with his disciples, took bread, gave you thanks, broke the bread, and gave it to them, saying, "Take, eat: this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me."

Deacon: Great is the mystery of faith:
