We gather

At home, have ready in an honoured place a portion of food and something to drink. It may be bread and wine or something else. Set your Bible alongside. You might light a candle.

Music as we gather: God has gone up with a shout of rejoicing

God has gone up with a shout of rejoicing: he has ascended in glory! O clap your hands, clap your hands all you people: he has ascended in glory!

SERMON in Church is from David

For those worshipping at home:

What would you pray the night before your execution? It really would focus the mind, wouldn't it? If that's too stark, I wonder what you pray the night before, say, an operation you've been worrying about. Who comes to the fore as you get ready to leave? It may be that some among us are beginning to identify our longings and worries for the people we love as we recognise the end of our life might not be that far away. In a much lesser way, just before the experimental period of dispensability which is holiday, what are your prayers when you are getting ready to go?

John's account of Jesus' farewell meal is very long and deep. It is vividly remembered by the disciple who lived long enough to gather disciples around him, to whom he passed on the intimate details, like his resting his head on Jesus' chest as they reclined at the table; like the intense words Jesus spoke to them, then the even more intense words he said in their hearing to his Heavenly Father...our Heavenly Father. The prayer summarises the discourse preceding it, just as in Matthew's gospel, the Lord's Prayer catches the essence of the whole Sermon on the Mount which it concludes. Prayer can do that. It can be a distillation; a moment when we catch the essence, reach the heart of what concerns us. For those of us who feel sure the heavenly Parent is listening and responding all well and good. For those who may not be sure there's anyone listening, still prayer is that priceless poetic distillation of need and longing.

Privileged as we and the disciples are to overhear Jesus' longings for us, we could summarise them as his wanting us to know that, although he is taken from our sight, still he is with us, in us, and in his return to heaven, we can trust more than ever that the reality of our vulnerable humanity is held in the very heart of God. If that's all too theoretical, we listen to his prayer carefully and hear his acknowledgement of how difficult it can be to live without sight of him and the reassuring feel of his physical touch. The disciples at least could remember it. John's disciples decades later could at least remember the touch of John who had felt the touch of Jesus and heard his heartbeat. Thank God they eagerly gathered John's memories and saved them for us, in the Gospel named after him. He tells us Jesus prays specifically also for those of us more historically distant from the intimacy he was privileged to know. It is for many of us, then, enlivening to receive Jesus' physical touch through Holy Communion and through the touch of others at the peace, emphasising our unity in him.

Jesus then prays that we will know and feel no less a togetherness with him as his disciples feel and that we will experience it as joy: his joy in us, becoming our joy in him. He prays that we "may have [his] joy made complete among [our]selves." It is in fellowship that we will feel his life flowing into ours.

His prayer then anticipates that for many onlookers his people will look perhaps oddly different, set apart, almost as though living in another world; or seeing this world in a very different way. That will sometimes lead to hostility, just as it was leading him towards the cross.

We need to be careful here, because we could allow a sectarian superiority to develop. Tragically, at times, the togetherness of the church has been exactly that. But that is not the togetherness Jesus prays for. He makes this prayer for a vulnerable community in danger, hence all the reassuring images of sheepfolds, of vines, of profound togetherness. But this is not exclusive or superior. In the vine image, remember, he challenged the strong fellowship to bear fruit – that's goodness for other people's benefit outside the vineyard. He also challenged them to see that if anyone bears the fruit of the Spirit in their life, avowed Christian or not, we must assume the Spirit is working in them. Any us and them is blurred, not exaggerated by John.

If it is in fellowship that we discover Christ's joy, we might feel disheartened when we are forced to be alone. Before I go away, I have the privilege of taking communion to some who are compelled to stay at home. It is very much intended to underline your part in the fellowship, your belonging, your abiding in the vine. The Ascension last Thursday also affirms us when we are alone. Christ returned not to created distance, but to be with us intimately, everywhere. Rest assured he is with you and in being so binds you into the fellowship of the whole church.

If you feel ready this morning, give yourself space to allow such longings to emerge for you and find who it is, deep down, you want to pray for today.

We affirm our faith

We stand and at home, if able, we turn to look in the direction of Church, to affirm our faith in God, revealed to us as Father, Son and Holy Spirit:

he is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come to judge the living and the dead.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

We tell the story of salvation

Priest: The Lord is here.

All: God's Spirit is with us.

Lift up your hearts.

We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

It is right to give thanks and praise.

Glorious God, in Moses, the prophets and the psalms you showed your purpose for your people and your love for the world. In Jesus you fulfilled your promises and opened to us your heart. In his passion and death we saw the consequences of our rejection and the depth of your yearning. Yet you raised Jesus from the tomb. In his resurrection you invite us into the company of your eternal joy, and in his ascension on high you seal as complete his work among us. So with angels and archangels and all the company of heaven we praise you for ever, singing:

Repeat each line after cantor

Holy, holy, holy Lord!

God of power and God of might. Heav'n and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest!

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord most high. Hosanna. Hosanna in the highest.

Gracious God, your Son at his ascension promised the disciples they would be clothed with power from on high. Send now your Holy Spirit, that we may know the presence of your Son among us and that bread broken and wine outpoured may be for us his body and blood. Who, at supper with his disciples, took bread, gave you thanks, broke the bread, and gave it to them saying, "Take, eat: this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me."

A bell is rung

After supper he took the cup. Again he gave you thanks, and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Drink this, all of you: this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me."

Generous God, your Son told his disciples to stay in the city until they were clothed by the Spirit. Deacon: As our Saviour taught us, so we pray:

Priest: We break this bread to share in the body of Christ.

Draw near with faith. Receive the body of our Lord Jesus Christ which he gave for you. Eat in remembrance that he died and now lives for you, and feed on him in your heart by faith with thanksgiving.

We sing: Jesus, Lamb of God, have mercy on us.

Jesus, bearer of our sins, have mercy on us.

Jesus, Redeemer of the world, give us your peace. (x2)

We pause to remember all who pray at home, then share the bread, now for us the body of Christ.
